Ohio Workforce Coalition Overview

- 1. Formally organized in 2007 in response to a report that showed that 70% of people under 200% of poverty in Ohio are working.
- Historically focused on adult workforce and education issues—OCOG, Industry Workforce Alliance Grants, adult literacy, and even local WIA policies
- Welcomed into the National Skills
 Coalition's SkillSpan State Policy Network in 2021 and have been rebuilding
 - New policy priorities that are system focused
 - Job quality and racial equity focused
 - Building the network and sharing information




Ohio Workforce Coalition Today

Ohio Workforce Coalition Today: Policy
