

The mission of the Ohio Urban Resources System (OURS) is to empower Ohio's Urban Community Action Agencies for maximum impact. We envision the Ohio Urban Resources System as a leading entity strengthening the social and economic security of families and their communities

OURS IMPACT

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OURS agencies represent 56 percent of the state's total population and 62 percent of those households are living at or below the Federal Poverty Level.

More than \$50 million in federal funds for CSBG, Head Start, Weatherization and other programs and services.

Millions more in COVID relief funds saving more than 40,000 homes.

There are many needs in the web of poverty. What we're looking for is what the greatest needs are, and where the needs are particularly high. This will guide our understanding of where to place our focus within communities.

Out of 16 counties served among the partners,

- 11 have an unemployment rate worse than the overall state rate
- 20% of OURS partner programs are targeted at workforce development and employment.
- 12 have a greater percentage of children in poverty compared to the state overall
- 5% of OURS partner programs address Head Start and accessibility.
- 10 have a greater percentage of individuals experiencing food insecurity compared to the state overall
- 2% of OURS partner programs address food.
- 6 have a higher percentage of individuals experiencing a severe housing cost burden compared to the state figure
- 48% of OURS partner programs are targeted at housing and housing assistance.

There are clear disparities for Black and African American households, Hispanic or Latinx households, and women





CONNECTIONS WORK READINESS TRAINING

Connections is a thee week holistic workforce development training focusing on self-management, personal and professional development.

Connections increases competency and prepares job seekers for the workplace.

CAREER PATHWAY PROGRAMS

Build Up Core and Skilled Trades

Build Up Core (6 weeks) and Build Up Skilled Trades (12 weeks) provide hands-on training and nationally accredited certifications in construction trades and Carpentry.

- National Center for Construction Education and Research Certification (NCCER)
- Comprehensive case management support from Self-Sufficiency Coordinator

Empowered!

Empowered! is a 12 week career exploration program for young adults ages 18-24 who reside in the City of Columbus and focuses on providing People of Color, women and people from Opportunity Neighborhoods pathways to good paying careers, that lead to upward mobility in the construction and clean energy sector. Young adults will be exposed to careers in Building Construction Trades, Solar, EV Charging, AEP Ohio Lineworker & Affordable Housing Manufacturing.

Roads2Work

In partnership with Capital Transportation Academy, Roads 2 Work is a 5-week holistic training program that leads to Class A Commercial Driver's License (CDL).



IMPACT Information Technology CompTIA

Offers Franklin County residents the opportunity to complete **CompTIA and CompTIA A+** certifications that will help kick start an IT career. This program is a 16-week curriculum and offers a \$100 weekly stipend.

IMPACT Health Medical Assistant Program

IMPACT and Larock Healthcare Academy have partnered to provide individuals with the knowledge and skills to become medical assistants. This is a 7-week training where participants will receive 4 credentials:

Phlebotomy
EKG Technician
Patient-Care/Multi-Skilled Technician
Medical Assistant

Phlebotomy and EKG are both 5-week programs that can be taken independently.

All programs provide a \$200 weekly stipend and wrap-around services.

RE-ENTRY WORK-READINESS

The Re-Entry Program is a three-week program that teaches skills necessary to successfully integrate formerly-incarcerated individuals back into the community.

FINANCIAL SERVICES

Drive to Thrive

The Drive to Thrive Program is a **2:1 matched savings program** that supports individuals leveraging their savings to gain an asset through **vehicle ownership**. The program leads to increased financial capability and vehicle ownership.

SMART Tax Prep

In partnership with the United Way of Central Ohio, SMART Tax Prep offers **free**, **in-person tax preparation** for filers who earn less than \$65,000 annually. Income-eligible filer's taxes are prepared by **certified Volunteer Income Tax Assistance** (VITA) professionals.

SIDE HUSTLE

The Side Hustle program is an **introductory entrepreneur class** that gives the tools, and the support to **launch and maintain a small 1-2-person micro-enterprise** by the time of graduation. They will have the opportunity to earn **\$800 in Training Stipends** and an **additional \$1,000 through an IDA account**. The class will be taught in a virtual format, using Zoom, Monday through Friday from 10am to 2pm.

Eligibility & Requirements

- Household income at or below 125% of Federal Poverty Guidelines
- 4-week commitment, four hours per day
- Access to a computer with broadband internet
- Microsoft Office (2013 or later)
- Adobe Acrobat Reader

YOUTH SERVICES

ACHIEVE. MORE. & PROSPER.

A.M.P. is an innovative program that assists low-income young adults build career paths, find employment and break the cycle of poverty.

All participants are paired up with an **A.M.P. coach** – or **personal advocate** – who works with them to build a customized plan for their future while helping them address current challenges.

A.M.P. participants participate in services and remain in the program for as much or a little time as they need to accomplish their goals. Upon program exit, AMP Coaches stay in contact for an additional 12 months of follow-up care.


Participant Benefits

- Comprehensive case management and personalized plan development with an AMP Coach
- Career exploration, goal planning and leadership and soft skill development
- Paid work experience and internship opportunities
 - IMPACT pays \$10.00/hour for up to 160 hours of for each young adult
- Financial assistance for tuition, training costs, tutoring and needed technology
 - Individual Training Accounts for up to \$15,000/participant per year
- Supportive services for housing, utilities, childcare, transportation, work uniforms and tools and more
- Cash incentives for completion of milestone goals
 - Lifetime maximum of \$1,750 for an ISY and
- \$2,350 for an OSY participant.





- Entrepreneurial program for youth designed to support young people interested in starting a business or being an entrepreneur
- BOSS UP! will walk through the various steps of starting a businessfrom turning an idea into a potential business plan, understanding market dynamics & potential competition, cost benefit analysis, production cost, how to pitch ideas to potential funders, and most importantly, how to market a small business effectively
- Program concludes with "Shark Tank"-style competition and the top 3
 participants will be awarded seed funding for their business
 proposals



OFF THE BLOCK CAPITAL

- Wealth inequality has long been an issue for marginalized communities. Without access to wealth building tools, low-resource communities are stuck in a vicious cycle of poverty.
- The curriculum will walk participants through the various parts of understanding stocks and financial literacy. The first pillar will introduce participants to the importance of understanding personal finance. Next, we will go into detail about what constitutes a stock. Each participant will be eligible to receive a Weekly stipend based on attendance and participation

Serves:

- Income-eligible youth with household incomes at or below 200% of the Federal Poverty Guidelines
- Ages 14-18 who are currently enrolled in high school
- Youth who are actively interested in pursing a career in financial services or becoming financially independent

We will ignite the power of youth leadership and enhance youth leadership skills through high-quality, engaging workshops that produce strong emerging leaders.

WORKFORCE DEVELOPMENT PROGRAM

MYCAP WORKFORCE DEVELOPMENT PROGRAM

- MYCAP developed employment and training program 6 years ago, with career readiness, soft skills initiatives.
- 2018 MYCAP began developing strong partnerships, became a member of the Manufacturing Coalition / Work Advance to provide the career readiness classes and prepare candidates for manufacturing job openings.
- ▶ 2019 MYCAP also entered into a partnership with a Professional Development Center and provided 2 staff to recruit, train, and provide interview opportunities to local jobs. About 800 candidates received orientation at the center; 110 job placements. Outcomes have been challenging in comparison to orientation.
- Participation and out comes at Job Fairs, do we know how many actually sought jobs and were hired. How effective are Job Fairs?

MYCAP

"THE KEY IS ADAPTING TO EVER CHANGING CONDITIONS"

- MYCAP continues to make changes to the Workforce Development program, and adapt to the ever changing mindset and conditions that the pandemic has caused.
- MYCAP has presented several grant initiatives to adjust the program to these changes.
- "Meet the job searcher where they are today". What does that mean?
- Individualized assessments tool; conducted by licensed social workers, counselors.

- Provide the job searcher the preparation needed before enter training or career readiness. Example; counseling, mental health services, medical services, coaching, mentoring.
- When prepared as signed off by LSW or counselor, match the job searcher to mindset, personal goals, capabilities, interest and skill set to jobs or educational training available.
- What does support services look like and for how long?
- ► How is program success determined?

The Employment and Career Services Programs and Partnerships including Entrepreneurship

The Professional and Individual Development (PAID) Program



PAID is the key workforce program at Pathway that serves as the driver to an other employment programs and services. Through classroom instruction and Career Coaching, the program specializes in providing professional and individual development training, job skill and digital literacy assessments, effective job search and interviewing techniques, problem-solving skills, access to certification opportunities, linkages to educational opportunities and job placement services.

Since January of 2022, 66 participants have enrolled in the program and 59 graduating. Of the 59, 28 have secured employment with 10 earning a living wage. 10 of these jobseekers chose to further their education by enrolling into a short-term certification program.

Financial Opportunity Center (FOC) Partnership with the Local Initiative Support Corporation (LISC)

Financial Literacy is offered to anyone seeking to change their financial well-being. Pathway partners with other FOC's to provide the following services:





- Dealing with Debt
- General Finances and Saving
- Credit (Scores, Reports, Repair, etc.)
- VITA Tax Preparation Services in partnership with United Way Since July 2021, 141 individuals have enrolled to receive financial services

Bridges to Career Opportunities (LISC Partnership)

Pathway partners with the Local Initiative Support Corporation (LISC) to offer interested applicants the opportunity to receive access to foundational literacy skills, technical training, and/or pursue certification opportunities in a particular industry.

Participants also receive financial coaching to set long-term goals and help manage expenses during training. The BCO program connects clients jobs with a career pathway and helps local employers staff up with employees who can get the job done.

Ohio To Work/ Jobs Ohio Workforce Partnership

Pathway partners with LISC and Ohio to Work/Jobs Ohio, to offer additional educational and employment training supports to jobseekers and employers.

Certification supports are offered to jobseekers wanting a certification in IT, Advance Manufacturing, and Healthcare.

Prevention/Retention/Contingency (PRC) Program Partnership with LISC and LCDJFS

Pathway partners with LCDJFS and LISC to provide work supports and other supportive services to assist TANF eligible (200% of the Federal Poverty Level) families with overcoming immediate barriers.

In order to qualify for this program there must be a minor child in the home and/or a non-custodial parent(s) that reside in Ohio.

Since January 2022, 38 households have received PRC Services.

The Career Connections Closet

Pathway offers program participant's free new and/or gently used clothing through the Career Connections Closet. Job seekers are encouraged to utilize the supportive services to assist them in becoming work ready.

All Donations are accepted daily to replenish inventory.

The Summer Youth Employment Program (SYEP)

Partnership with Lucas County Department of Job and Family Services

Pathway partners with LCDJFS to offer in school youth, ages 14-18 years of age, a summer work experience. Youth are able to receive a one week paid orientation to help them become work ready, followed by a seven week work experience on the job. Youth are assigned to a Career Coach to mentor them and guide them through their work experience.

Pathway partners with Toledo Urban Federal Credit Union to offer checking and savings accounts, as well as other banking services to the youth and their families.

Owens/Aspire Community College Partnership

Pathway partners with Owens Aspire/Adult Basic Learning Equivalency (ABLE), formerly called the GED Program. Individuals who wish to complete their high school education can sign up for classes free of charge, and work to master the coursework necessary to pass the Standardized Test.

Classes are offered at Pathway on Tuesday and Thursday between the hours of 5:30 p.m. and 8:30 p.m.

Toledo Municipal Court Partnership:

Incorporating hard to employ and vulnerable populations in the workforce

Pathway partners with Toledo Municipal Court (TMC) to offer employment services to the re-entry population. The goal of the partnership is to reduce recidivism by linking offenders to living wage jobs, education, and case management services.
